Written in SuperCollider, the piece uses a library of sounds taken from the book *Apuntes sobre nuevos recursos tímbricos para instrumentos de cuerda frotada* by Marcelo Ajubita.

Program Notes

Ask not ... for tuba and soundfile, is based on John F. Kennedy's Inaugural Address of 1961. The computer part is derived from the famous line "And so my fellow Americans, ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country." It was composed in the early part of 2011 and premiered in Raleigh, NC, at the Southeastern Composers League Forum on March 15, 2011.

Commissioned by the Alys Stephens Performing Arts Center in Birmingham, Alabama, **I/O** was originally designed as a 13-channel surround sound installation. Today's two-channel arrangement is divided into three parts and uses spoken text – a passage taken from Luigi Russolo's 1913 manifesto "The Art of Noise," a lecture presented by Karlheinz Stockhausen in 1972, and an interview given by John Cage in 1991 – to construct a large-scale musical and textual narrative. The work was composed and edited in the recording studios at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB).

A House Lost in the Forest was composed for pianist Diana Peoples (the composer's wife). It features many contrasting elements, and is based on the inspiration of a new home the composer and Diana moved to, secluded and surrounded by forest with an overhanging canopy. The piece is imaged/accompanied by the following poem:

Light, Dances on the swaying leaves. Shadows, Play hide and seek.

The thunder of an acorn falling, Fills the canopy with autumn sparks.

> Sun, Tickles the canopy. Showers, Caress spider webs.

Beneath it all, A House Lost in the Forest.
